Unit I

Nature of International Law; Sanctions behind International Law, Bases of International Law; Sources of International Law, Relations between International law and Municipal Law, Historical Development of International Law: Factors helping the growth of International Law: Marxist view, States in International Law: Codification of International Law and Major Conventions after World War-II.

Unit II
